

# Objectives of Step 1

Complete the diagnostic checklist to:

1. Identify and describe key aspects of the commissioning approach including objectives, structure, process of planning, implementation, monitoring and evaluation
2. Develop preliminary reflections on the potential equity, gender, human rights and social determinants issues to be considered as part of the review – a baseline.

# Key messages: Step 1

- Establishing a basic shared understanding of issues such as the program aims, objectives, target population, core interventions and operational partners and implementation challenges
- Using the checklist to create a 'baseline' for the current program – to be used for the subsequent steps of any Innov8 review



# Checklist overview

1. What are the stated goal(s), objectives and expected outcomes of the commissioning process
2. What topic or problem does the program address?
3. How are human rights incorporated?
4. What is the target population and are any subpopulations prioritised?
5. How are population needs assessed in commissioning?
6. What are the main activities of the program?

# Checklist overview cont


7. How does the commissioning process consider context?
8. Who implements and conducts commissioning?
9. How does the commissioning process incorporate principles of a human rights-based approach and elements of the right to health?
10. How does the program include mechanisms for social participation?
11. How does it include intersectoral action?
12. What are the main achievements and what indicators are used to verify these?

# Checklist overview cont

13. What are some of the potential equity, gender, human rights and social determinants of health issues to be addressed in any review?



# Expected outcomes of Step 1



- Familiarity with and confidence in using the checklist
- Country adaptation of the checklist
- List of sources and information (data and people to consult) needed for completing the checklist
- A timeline and a workplan for the review team to finalise the checklist
